- (c) No contact with the enemy, although depth charges were dropped at 0740 on the 1 November 1944. The Commodore passed back submarine warnings on 7 November and again on 8 November.
- (d) Passage was uneventful with the above exceptions. Lights were shown in accord with instructions received from Convoy Commodore. Weather was good and a fair average speed was maintained.
- (e) The only loss of time occured in waiting at the convoy assemble point. Loading of ballast was efficient and fast.
- (f) The radio operator did carry out "Wartime radio instructions of Merchant Vessels. The radio log was signed daily by the Master and by myself.

The 4/50 on the stern of this ships should be replace by a 3/50. The present gun causes considerable damage when fired.

- (h) The Captain and Officers of the ship did carry out "Wartime Instructions ofr Merchant Vessels.
- (i) No reccommendations are submitted.
- (j) All friendly aircraft followed the proper procedure in approaching the convoy.
- (k) Classes are held daily for men who are qualifying for Slc and for those that are striking for Petty Officer Ratings. Gun Drills on all of the guns are held as often as is possible to perfect the working of the gun crews. Experienced Merchant Seaman have been used in the teaching of seamanship to members of the Armed Guard Crew. Tracking drills are held when friendly aircraft present tracking targets.
