(c) Contacts and adtion with the enemy: None

(d) General resume of the voyage: Upon leaving both Colombo, and Ceylon I did not receive any notification concerning a departure conference, therefore, I did not attend a departure at either port.

From Calcutta, India to Port Said, Egypt the ship burned navigation lights at full brilliancy, and sailed with the ship

undarkened.

Therewas a great deal of internal friction aboard ship between the master and his ships officers. Rarely did a ships

officer speak to the master unles it was on business.

There were two fights aboard ship in Calcutta, India. One on 8 July 1945 at 0130 between the ships steward and the navy gun crew. I pressed charges against the steward which was taken care of by Coast Guard Intelligence and the steward was found guilty on three charges and given eight months probation. the navy men were found not guilty. The second fight occurred on 1800 July 1945 at 2300 between the ships bos'n and the officers messman, the messman was taken to the hospital for treatment. The captain was notified of the fight but did not leave his bunk to see what had happened.

On 4 August 1945 the entire ships crew filed a petition and brought it to the captain saying they were not getting sufficient

food. In no way was the navy gun crew involved.

(e) The ship made a reasonable turnaround.

- (f) The commercial radio operators appeared to carry out wartime instructions for merchant vessels and kept all intercepted messages confidential.
  - (g) There are no defects or deficiencies.to report.
- (h) The ships officers appeared to carry out Wartime Instructions for Merchant Vessels.
- (i) 1. With all the paper work that goes with the job of being an armed guard officer, I feel that a typewriter should be sent along as part of the regular gear.
- (j) There was no improper proceedure on the part of freindly aircraft approaching the vessel either when sailing independently or in convoy. We sailed alone all the time.

- (k) Training at sea: Lectures have been given on the following subjects: Orientation, Small Arms Instructions, Articles of the Government of the Navy, Abandon Ship, Liberty Instructions, Venereal (Health) Cargo Pilferage, Bensorship, First Aid, Safety Precautions, Gas Mask Drill, Life Jackets and Voting.
