SHIPS CARPENTER FINALLY BUILT A MAKESHIFT STRUCTURE AFTER SHIP HAD PUT TO SEA. LOADING PERFORMED BY ARAB WORKMEN SUPERVISED BY ARMY OFFICERS.
- (F) THE MERCHANT RADIO OPERATORS APPEARED TO CARRY OUT WARTIME RADIO INSTRUCTIONS PARTICULARLY IN REGARD TO KEEPING INTERCEPTED MESSAGES CONFIDENTIAL.
- (G) THERE ARE NO DEFECTS IN ARMAMENT OR EQUIPMENT REQUIRING IMMEDIATE ATTENTION.
- (H) THE MASTER AMD OFFICERS OF THE SHIP WERE DILIGENT ABOUT CARRYING OUT " WARTIME INSTRUCTIONS FOR U.S. MERCHANT SHIPS".
