IN ACCORDANCE WITH REFERENCE (A) THE FOLLOWING 1. INFORMATION IS SUBMITTED: -

- (A) TYPE OF VESSEL: FREIGHTER (LIBERTY) TYPE OF CARGO: BALLAST OWNER OF WESSEL: U.S. WAR SHIPPING ADMINISTRATION CHARTERED TO: A.H.BULL & CO., N.Y. (OPERATORS)
- (B) PORT OF DEPARTURE: NEWPORT, ENGLAND DATE OF DEPARTURE: DECEMBER 28, 1943 CONVOYED SPEED (AVERAGE): 8 KNOTS NUMBER OF SHIPS IN ESCORT: MOST COUNTED AT ANY

ONE TIME WAS 12, ONE MERCHANT CARRIER AND ONE RESCUE SHIP. FRE-QUENT PATROL AIRCRAFT WERE SIGHTED.

NUMBER OF SHIPS IN CONVOY: 58 (ACCORDING TO CRUISING PLAN)

PORT OF ARRIVAL: HALIFAX, N.S. DATE OF ARRIVAL: JANUARY 16, 1944

- (C) THIS VESSEL HAD NO CONTACT NOR ACTION WITH THE ENEMY.
- (D) THE VOYAGE WAS ROUTINE THROUGHOUT. RATHER SEVERE ROUGH WEATHER WAS ENCOUNTERED FOR ABOUT TEN DAYS. FRE-QUENT SEAS WERE TAKEN OVER THE FOREPEAK; THE FOREDECK WAS CONSTANTLY UNDER SPRAY. THE BOW POUNDED AS THE SHIP PITCHED AND THE SCREW VIBRATED, THE EFFECTS OF WHICH WERE FELT SEVERELY THROUGHOUT THE SHIP. TWO READY SERVICE BOXES WERE LOOSENED AS A RESULT. THE VESSEL ROLLED INCESSANTLY. ONCE THE STEERING APPARATUS WAS RENDERED INOPERATIVE AND THE SHIP CIRCLED INSIDE THE CONVOY AND GRADUALLY DROPPED

ASTERN OF IT BUT REGAINED HER POSITION BEFORE DUSK.

THE CREW ENGAGED IN FIRING PRACTICE ON LEAVING MILFORD HAVEN AND WAS COMPLIMENTED ON ITS MACHINE GUN FIRING BY THE D.E.M.S.'S "DRIFTER" (WHICH SUPPLIED THE TARGET FLARES) AS FOLLOWS: - "GOOD SHOOTING; YOU CUT FLARE FROM PARACHUTE.)

- (E) THIS VESSEL LAY AT ANCHOR AT BARRY ROADS FROM 1358 DECEMBER 28 TO 0905 DECEMBER 29, 1943 AS PER INSTRUCTIONS RECEIVED FROM NAVAL CONTROL AT NEWPORT, ENGLAND. THIS VESSEL ANCHORED AT MILFORD HAVEN AT 1607 DECEMBER 29, 1943 AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL 1600 DECEMBER 30, 1943. THE PURPOSE OF THIS STOP WAS TO ATTEND CONVOY CONFERENCE AT MILFORD, WALES.
- (F) THE COMMERCIAL RADIO OPERATOR APPEARED TO CARRY OUT WARTIME RADIO INSTRUCTIONS PARTICULARLY IN REGARD TO KEEPING INTERCEPTED MESSAGES CONFIDENTIAL.
- (G) THE PORT READY SERVICE BOXES AT THE FORWARD AND AFTER GUNS ARE LOOSE FROM THE DECK AND REQUIRE WELDING IN PLACE.

THE ARMED GUAR D COMMANDER'S CABIN IS ENTIRELY TOO SMALL FOR LIVING QUARTERS AS WELL AS THE CONDUCT OF THE BUSINESS WHICH A CREW OF 27 MEN ENTAILS. HIS CABIN IS AS SMALL AS THE SMALLEST CABIN OCCUPIED BY A LICENSED MERCHANT MARINE OFFICER ABOARD.

THE ARMED GUARD CREW'S QUARTERS AND LOCKERS ARE ESPECIALLY CROWDED AS APPEARS FROM THE COMPARISON WITH MERCHANT PERSONNEL FACILITIES BELOW:
SPACE IN LIVING QUARTERS PER MAN:

MERCHANT - - - - 225 CUBIC FEET ARMED GUARD - - 133 CUBIC FEET

LOCKER SPACE PER MAN:

MERCHANT - - - - 13.6 CUBIC FEET ARMED GUARD - - 6.4 CUBIC FEET

PART OF THE DECK HOUSE ON THE PORT SIDE AND WHICH IS OCCUPIED BY SEVEN MEMBERS OF THE ARMED GUARD, MOISTURE CONDENSES ON THE BULKHEADS AND FREEZES TO ICE. THE COMPARTMENT IS AL-WAYS RATHER FRIGID AND UNCOMFORTABLE.

- (H) THE MASTER AND OFFICERS OF THE SHIP WERE DIDIGENT ABOUT CARRYING OUT "WARTIME INSTRUCTIONS FOR U.S. MERCHANT SHIPS".
  - (I) THERE ARE NO RECOMMENDATIONS.
- (J) NO IMPROPER PROCEDURE ON THE PART OF FRIENDLY AIRCRAFT APPROACHING THIS VESSEL WAS NOTED.
