THE FOLLOWING DEFECTS OR DEFISIENCIES WERE NOTED:- 1-THERE IS A NINE DEGREE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE BEARINGS ON THE TRAINING CIRCLE OF THE 3"50 GUN AND CORRECT RELATIVE BEARINGS.

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- 2-VENTILATION OF THE FORWARD MAGAZINE IS INADEQUATE TO KEEP THE TEMPERATURE WITHIN A SAFE RANGE.
- 3-QUARTERS, LOCKERS AND ESPECIALLY STORAGE SPACE ARE CROWDED.
- 4- FOUR OF THE OERLIKON GUNS CAN BE TRAINED ON PARTS OF THE SHIP.
- 5-STOPS ON THE 3"50 GUN PREVENT ADEQUATE COVERAGE OF THE AIR.
- 6-THE ARMED GUARD PERSONNEL INCLUDES ONLY ONE SIGNALMAN. AS A CONSEQUENCE HE IS STANDING DOUBLE WATCHES.

(G) THE MASTER AND OFFICERS OF THE SHIP CARRIED OUT "WARTIME INSTRUCTIONS FOR UNITED STATES MERCHANT SHIPS". BLACKOUT REGULATIONS WERE RIGIDLY OBSERVED.
