 - (a) Type of vessel: Liberty.

 Type of cargo: Oil and water ballast.

 Owner of vessel: War Shipping Administration.

 - (b) Port of departure: Yokohama, Japan, 1 October 1945.
 Proceeded independently.
 Speed: 10.4 Nats.
 Port of arrival: San Francisco, Calif., 20 October 1945.
 - (c) No contact with the enemy.
 - (d) The voyage was routine with no special incident. Navigation lights were shown and the vessel was no longer blacked out. No zig-zag.
 - (e) The vessel was delayed three days at Yokohama waiting to be discharged. Thereafter discharge was very slow due to lack of transportation and cargo handling facilities.

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- (f) Commercial radio operators (three) appeared to carry out "War Time Radio Instructions for Merchant Vessels".
- (g) No defects or deficiencies in location or arrangements of the battery, or in equipment as regards material, personnel or operation.
- (h) The Master and Officers carried out "War Time Instructions for Merchant Vessels" to the best of their ability.
- (i) No recommendations tending the improvement or greater efficiency of the service.
- (j) No improper proceedure on the part of friendly aircraft approaching the vessel.
- (k) All Armed Guard crew training consisted of signaling classes while in port and on the homeward bound voyage.
