- (a) Type of vessel: Cargo (EC 2 "Liberty")
 Owner of vessel: U.S.A., represented by War Shipping Administration.
- (b) Port of departure: Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. Date: July 11, 1943.
 Convoyed or independent: Convoyed.
 Speed (Aver.): 7./ knots.
 Number of escort vessels: 4. Number of escort aircraft: 1 and 2 at a time, patrolling from shore.
 Port of arrival: Sydney, New South Wales, Australia. Date: July 14, 1943.
- (c) Contacts and action with the enemy: None.

(d) General resume of voyage:

Average speed of vessel: 7. / knots. Lights shown: None. No zig-zag instructed; none performed.

- (e) There was no delay in port due to lack of port facilities.
- (f) Commercial radio operator appeared to carry out wartime radio instructions for merchant vessels, with respect to keeping intercepted messages confidential, and otherwise.

(g) Defects or deficiencies: (1) In location or arrangements of battery, None. (2) In equipment as regards materiel: 3 Inch 50 Cal. gun at stern should be replaced by a heavier gun, and 3 Inch 50 Cal. gun should be mounted forward; or a second 3" 50 Cal. gun should replace the 20 MM MG in bow. Should have a bore gage and a lapping out head for 3 inch 50 Cal. gun. Should have additional general alarm bells in fire room, and forward and aft on main deck. (3) In equipment as regards personnel: Naval personnel is insufficient to maintain fully efficient lookout watches on a 24-hour basis, or effectively to man armament now installed on board (1 officer, 1 BM 2/c, 1 GM 3/c, 1 SM 3/c, 1 S 1/c (Signalman striker), 12 S 1/c gunners. 1 3" 50 Cal. gun in stern, and 9 20 MM machine guns). Should have at least the 9 additional gunners which present personnel allowance permis (4 men per 3" 50 Cal. gun, 2 men per 20 MM machine gun).

- (h) Master and officers of the ship did appear to carry out "Wattime Instructions for United States Merchant Vessels".
- (i) Recommendations tending to the improvement or greater efficiency of this service: 1. Increased naval personnel for gun crews and lookouts. 2. More thorough Naval indoctrination of enlisted Naval personnel.
- (j) Improper procedure on the part of friendly aircraft: None.

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
