1. In accordance with Reference (a), the following information is submitted:

A. Name of vessel: S.S. Abigail Adams.

Type of Vessel: "Liberty" EC2 Freighter.

Owner of Vessel: U. S. A., represented by the War Shipping Administration.

Gross tons: 7,176. Cargo: Cement, iron pipe, construction machinery,

motor trucks, creosoted poles, Etc. Charter: De La Rama S.S. Co., Inc.

B. Port of Departure: San Francisco (9th Ave. Pier, Oak-

land), California. Time and Date of Departure: 1200, April 11, 1943.

Sailed in Convoy, or Singly: In Convoy. No. of Ships in Convoy: 15.*

No. of Escort Vessels: 1. No. of Escorting Aircraft: 0.

Speed of Convoy: 9 Knots. Port of Arrival: Honolulu, T. H.

Time and Date of Arrival at Honolulu, T. H.: 1215 Opril 22, 1943

C. Detailed Account of Contact with Enemy: No contact.

*: 12 ex San Fran. plus 3 (4-13-43) ex San Pedro, plus SS Miller (4-16-43), less SS Harper dropped astern 0300 4-20-43.

D. General Resume of Voyage: During first three days out, minor engine troubles caused ship to slow or stop occasionally; but without dropping out of convoy. 2035-2044, April 13, dropped out of convoy to repair telemotor. Station promptly regained. 0900-0912, April 14, lagged some 500 yards behind convoy for structural test firing of 3 inch gun. Station promptly regained. Speed of vessel: 4 to 9.8 Knots; Average 9.4 Knots. Lights shown: None. Fog signals used: None. No zig-zag instructed; none performed.

- E. Written or radio orders received by vessel from foreign government officials: None.
- F. Commercial radio operator appeared to carry out wartime radio instruction for merchant vessels, with regard to keeping intercepted messages confidential, and otherwise.
- battery: None. In equipment as regards materiel: 3-inch 50-Cal. (Mk.22)
 gun should be equipped with pipe stop for train and elevation. Platforms for
 20 MM. machine guns: Nos. 1 to 9, inclusive, should be equipped with barrelcooling "pots", as well as spare-barrel-storage "pots". Should have bore
 gage, and bore-lapping head for 3-Inch 50-Cal. gun. Should have 5 additional
 (metal) 20 MM. barrel removing tools. Protective "splinter" sides of turret
 "tubs" for 20 MM. machine guns Nos. 1, 2, 3, 6 and 7, and for 3 Inch gun
 should be reinformed with "asphalt" composition, as are those for 20 MM. guns
 Nos. 4, 5, 8 and 9. In equipment as regards personnel: Naval personnel insufficient to maintain fully efficient lookout watches on 24-hour basis, or effectively to man armament (1 officer, 2 signalmen communications liason group -,
 1 GM 3/c, 11 S 1/c, 1 S 2/c; 1 3-In. 50-Cal., gun, 9 20 MM. machine guns).

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H. Master and officers of ship did carry out "INSTRUCTIONS FOR NAVAL TRANSPORTATION AND U.S. MERCHANT VESSELS IN TIME OF WAR". Master and ship's officers are very cooperative. However, because the master fails to see the necessity therefor, and particularly because he doubts the efficiency thereof, it has not been practicable to prepare a battle station bill for the entire ship's company, or give sufficient instruction to ship's company in supplementing gun crews. Tactful information - not censure - of master is indicated. I. Recommendations tending to the improvement or greater efficiency of this service: 1. Increased naval personnel for gun crews; 2. More thorough information of masters with regard to defensive procedure, particularly with respect to ship's company supplementing gum crews at definitely assigned stations; 3. More thorough naval indoctrination of enlisted naval personnel. J. Improper procedure on the part of friendly aircraft: None. ADDENDA: At 1715 on April 15, a large, unidentified vessel was sighted some 12 miles to starboard, hull-down, apparently on opposite course (approximately 062°, true), speed about 15 knots. Top of superstructure

amidships visible; one high mast forward, one high mast aft, each flanked by vertical spars of approximately one-half the height of the tall masts. Escort vessel went out to investigate. Strange vessel signaled with flashing light; but distance and mist prevented our reception of messages.

ADDENDA: At 0605, April 19, the sound of aircraft motors was heard. At 0610, a large plane, appearing to be a Boeing B-17, passed the convoy close aboard from astern, starboard to port, on a course of approximately 235° true; altitude approximately 6,000 feet, speed approximately 225-250 knots. ADDENDA: At 1150, April 20, a PBY plane was sighted ahead. After circling about the forward portion of convoy, it departed.

ADDENDA: At 1417, April 20, a PBY plane was sighted astern. After circling over and about convoy several times, it departed.

ADDENDA: At 1831, April 21, a large, unidentified plane (resembling a Dornier flying boat) was sighted off starboard bow, about 8,000 yards distant, altitude about 8,000 feet, on steady course of about 64° true. It disappeared in mist and darkness without changing course, speed, or altitude.

ADDENDA: April 22, shortly after dawn, the convoy was joined by an additional escort vessel; and from that time until arrival in destination port the vicinity of the convoy was constantly patrolled by numerous scout, patrol, and patrol-bomber planes bearing United Nations markings.
