SIR: Manning Division of the War Snipping Administra I have the honor to forward herewith in copy a letter received at the Consulate General from the Master of the American S.S. Admiral Halstead in commendation of certain of the members of the crew of that vessel during an enemy attack on Port Darwin. Australia, on February 19, 1942 when the vessel was lying in that port.

The personnel mentioned in the letter have been identified as far as possible as follows:

- Alan CURRIE, Third Mate, age 28, born in Massachusetts. Next of kin: Wife, Mrs. A. Currie, 710 Broderick Street, San Francisco, California.
- 4. John HAFFARD, A.B. (later Boatswain), age 38, born in Illinois. Certificate of Identification No. Z243699. Next of kin: Mrs. L. B. Haffard, 4730 Kenmore Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

Declassified NARA Project: NW 63684 NEINENT Fred ARCHIBALD, Chief Steward, age 44, born in Colombia and citizen of Colombia. Next of kin: Wife, Mrs. M. Archibald, 2722 Pine Street, San Francisco, California. All of the above named seamen were discharged and repatriated from Australia in August, 1942 except for Mr. Haffard, who was discharged in January, 1943 and repatriated shortly thereafter. It should be noted, however, that Mr. Milbourne has now returned to Australia and is serving again on the Admiral Halstead. Although this commendation may not appear to entitle the seamen to awards for heroism within the purview of the Department's mimeographed circular instruction of June 9, 1942 (File no. 093.112/468), it may be of value or assistance to the Commandant of the Coast Guard and to the Recruitment and Manning Division of the War Shipping Administration.
