FEDERAL WARNING—Operators of small American craft are in danger of prosecution by the government if they attempt to go near or contact belligerent vessels outside the three-mile limit, customs agents here reveal. When the British cruiser Orion was offshore after chasing the German freighter Arauca into Port Everglades, several boats went out to the sea warrior and delivered newspapers, cigarets, etc. This is a strict violation of neutrality laws.
