Subject: Armed Merchant Vessels.

Reference: (a) Your letter, 11 May, 1941 (WHL:cm)

1. The British S/S HELLER ISLE was inspected this date and the following armament was found on board:

GUNS AND AMMUNITION: (1) 1 - Q.F. 12-pdr mark I R.G.F. 1918 N. No. 6541. Elevation $40^{\circ} + 30^{\circ}$. Arc of train 360° . Telescopic sights. Located on the aft end of the after deck house. 54-rds powder charges; 50-rds H.E. shells and 6-practice shells.

SMALL ARMS AND AMMUNITION: 2-Boss rifles .303; 1-Colt revolver .32; 486-rds .303 and 14-rds .32.

MAGAZINE: Located port side after end of the after deck house. Flooded by hose through door only.

FIRE CONTROL AND COMMUNICATION: Telephone from bridge to gun. 1-Aldis daylight signalling lamp.

PERSONNEL: 1-Gun layer (Royal Navy); 1-merchant seaman gunner; balance of gun's crew taken from ship's regular force; 1-certified merchant navy defense officer on board.

MISCELLANEOUS: 1-steel helmet; 1-service gas mask; 1-Schermully pistol and 12-rockets; This vessel is not DeGaussed.

2. It is the opinion of this office that the above-mentioned armament is carried for defensive purposes only, provided, that the vessel is employed in normal trade.
