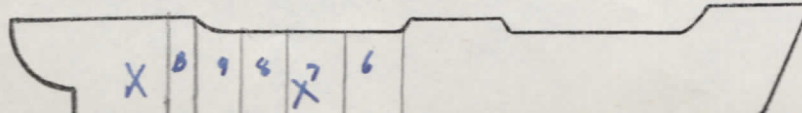
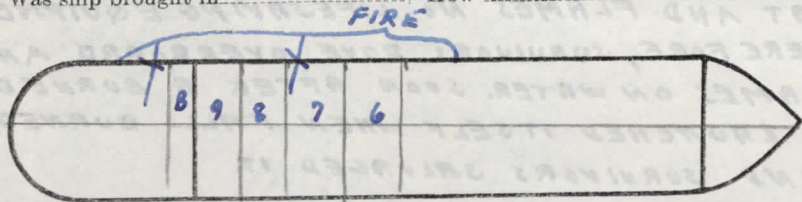

The comments, criticisms, or recommendations of survivors with respect to safety of seamen and ships involved in war actions are earnestly solicited by Headquarters in order that the fullest provision possible may be made for the safety of American ships and seamen.

NOTED DUE TO INTENSE HEAT AND FLAMES NO LIFESAVING EQUIPMENT COULD BE LAUNCHED. THEREFORE, SURVIVORS DOVE OVERBOARD AND SWAM BEYOND THE FLAMES ON WATER. SOON AFTER A BURNED LIFEBOAT, WHICH HAD LAUNCHED ITSELF WHEN FALLS BURNED, CAME DRIFTING BY, AND SURVIVORS SALVAGED IT.
