MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHAIRMAN OF THE CREW DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE, WAR SHIPPING ADMINISTRATION

The Coast Guard has received from a reliable source information concerning violations of security regulations by the following merchant crew members.

FORT ERIE, divulged the name of his ship and its probable sailing time over a public telephone on 17 November, 1943 while he was on shore leave in the Fiji Islands.

It is also reported that Erwin Weidel, a clerk, serving on a recent voyage of the WM. H. ASPINWALD, wrote a letter in October 1943 from the Persian Gulf, in which he divulged his intention to violate security regulations in his next letter. He stated that he was going to use a "Code of Agents" in his next letter to notify the recipient of his ship's next port of loading.

The Coast Guard will instigate whatever disciplinary action may be warranted in these cases.

Fort Brie Interview with Cpl., Billy B. Baker On November 25, 1943, this Agent interviewed Cpl., Billy B. Baker, Military Police Platoon, Lautoka, Fiji, regarding Subject. DATSON had been reported by Cpl. Baker to have fretly discussed the name of his ship (S.S. Fort Brie) which was anchored at Vunda Point and its probable sailing time over a public telephone. ond at Venda Point and its probable sailing time. Baker stated that on about 2100 Hours, 17 November 1943, Subject appeared at the Militery Police Headquarters, Lautoka, Fiji and asked if he might use the telephone to make a personal call. Cpl. Baker who was engaged in a conversation with Fvt. Medeiros gave DATHON permission and continued his discussion with Medeiros, the to thes BATECH over to the share nested for delivery to According to Baker, DATSON in his discussion over the telephone, mentioned the name of his ship two or three times and was cautioned by Baker to refrain from doing so. Baker commented that shortly after this DATSON again mentioned the Heme of his ship (S. S. Fort Erie) and also stated that the ship would leave Vunda Point within the next few hours. He added that at this time he asked DATSON to present his identification papers and also informed him that he would be detained for a short while. The statement street by MURRITY CHARLE

Baker stated that Subject's identification papers disclosed that Subject's name was ROBERT OREN LATSON and that he was a Merchant Marine Officer from the S. S. Fort Brie. He added that soon afterward a group of sailors from the S. S. Fort Erie, evidently in the same party as Subject, identified DATSON as being and Officer on the S. S. Fort Brie. Informant said that Subject was quite talkative and appeared to be under the influence of liquor. He added that Subject was wearing a Merchant Marine Officers cap and that he appeared to be about 27 years old. Baker described DATSON as being; 5ft 7" height, 170 weight and having a ruddy complexion.

In conclusion, Baker stated that a telephone call was made to Commander Peckenbaugh, Port Director, Vunda Point, Fiji, as to the disposition of Subject. He added that Commander Peckenbaugh advised the Military Police Office that DATSON should be turned over to the shore patrol for delivery to him and that he would interview Subject at his office. Baker added that he made a full report to his superior Officer, Lt. Edward J. Flynn, CMP, who is the acting Provost Marshall , give anyone my information that want't already knows

On December 1, 1943, this Agent interviewed Lieut. Comdr. J. Feckenpaugh. Port Director, Vunda Point, Fiji, in his office, regarding Subject. DATEON had been reported by Opl. Billy B. Baker, Military Police Platoon, Lautoka, Fiji, to have freely discussed the name of his ship (S. S. Fort Eric) which was anchored at Vunda Point and its probable sailing time.

Reckenpaugh stated that on November 17, 1943, he received a telephone call from the Miliaary Police, Lautoka, Fiji, stating that they had in their custody a Merchant Marine Officer, from the S. S. Fort Erie, who had violated certain security regulations. He added that he advised the Military Police to turn DATSON over to the shore patrol for delivery to him for questioning.

According to Informant, Subject was brought into his office by the shore patrol and appeared to be under the influence of liquor. He commented that he interviewed Subject relative to his violation of local security regulations and obsained the following information, Quote;

The following is a brief susmary of a statement given by ROBERT ORGIN DATSON to Lieut. Comdr. Peckenpaugh on or about 2130, 17 November 1943.

I had liberty until four o'clock. I had someone stand my watch. I can understand being picked up for being drunk but I don't get all this hokus-pokus. It doesn't seem right, and I know you are trying to find out something; and if you think I am deserting, well, go ahead, I don't give a damm, I wouldn't stay in the British Navy for all ---, I have my orders, I don't know what you are getting at and I don't give a damm, for my conscience is clear. I have all my papers. There they are. (Miscellaneous papers are handed to Mr. Peckenpaugh). My father is a British subject. In 1940, took out British passport. I deserted the British Navy and then came back on. (Pause) Something must be wrong for this kind of stuff don't go on for everybody. Oh, a guy can get tight and thrown in jail and that's all there is to it.

(When questioned relative to giving out information pertaining to movement of his ship, therby endangering the lives of his mates):

" I did not give anyone any information that wasn't already known. It was the M. P. 'S fault. They wanted to know all the information. I was in the police station when I asked for the ship. They told me to shut up but I told them I wouldn't shut up for I wanted to know when the ship was leaving. "

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(When asked if certain papers were his American Naval Discharge):

Yes, Sir, they are. Do you have to see it ? I am ashamed of it, Sir. I have a D. C.D. Oh, youll probably find out anyway. (Fapers are thrown on the desk). Excuse me. Sir. I didn't mean to throw it at you, Sir. They took my citizenship away."

(Mention was made by Mr. Feckenpaugh that he was trying to find out who he. DATSON was talking to since the ship had no phone, yet he. DATSON, talked to someone over phone relative to movement of vessel. DATSON appeared confused, claiming he placed the call in the police station and was under the impression he was connected with the ship).

"What I said never endangered the ship in any way. When I was in the bar I never said one single word. The cops brought that on. The cops asked if I was a merchant shipman. I said yes, and they asked what ship I was on and I toku them."

(Mr. Reckenpaugh informed DATSON he was going to send him back to his ship. DATSON apologized several times for any trouble he may have caused)

Note: In the opening conversation, DATSON admitted being drunk and insisted that he talked over phone to someone aboard ship.

Peckenpaugh saad that Subject's ship did not sail on the 17th November 1943. as reported by Subject, but left Vunda Point on 20th November 1943. He added that after he had interviewed Subject he had the shore patrol take DAT SON to his ship and leave instructions that Subject was not to have any shore liberty while at this base.

DATSON, was described by Peckenpaugh, as being; 5 ft 6" height, 150 weight, stokke build, light hair, light eyes, light complexion and appearing to
be about 30 years of age. He added that during the interview, Subject was nervous, appeared confused, and was easily excited. He concluded by saying that
he did not believe Subject's ship to be still at this base.
