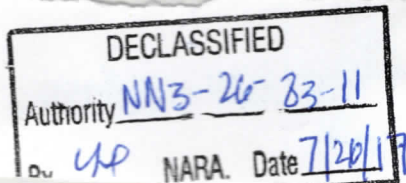

EXCERPT FROM BOARD. RPT., 5ND, SS "MARKAY" (US), dated 1-14 August 1943.

"The Master stated that port rules and regulations should be made as nearly uniform as possible. A typical example of this is at night in New York a ship is required to display its name plate with a searchlight focused on it; however, upon arriving in Beaumont, Texas, it was learned that the ship was subject to a fine if the name plate was displayed."
