This is to report a violation of the Oil Pollution Act of 1924, 33 USC 431-457, by the tank vessel, MARNE, owned and operated by the War Shipping Administration, at the Magnolia Oil Dooks, Beaumont, Texas, at 1500 on 28 June, 1945.

At 1500 on 28 June, 1945, the tank vessel, MARNE, owned and operated by the War Shipping Administration, was docked at the Magnelia Oil Docks, Beaumont, Texas, washing and stripping tanks No. 1, starboard and port, and No. 2 cross. It was noted that 100 octane gasoline was coming through the stripping lines, and as soon as this was noticed, the stripping was stopped. The gasoline had already covered an area approximately ten feet by forty feet between the ship and the deck. The Chief Mate, Erling Strand, who was the officer in charge at the time of the spill, reported that the ship was issued a gas free certificate on departure from New Orleans, Ia., and that the valves were checked at Baton Rouge, Ia., after loading 100 octane gasoline.

There was no evidence of drunkness, and this was not a case of emergency imperiling life or property, or unavoidable accident, collision or stranding. There was no evidence of negligence on the part of the officers or erew of subject vessel.

Samples of gaseline were taken by J.M. Britten, Sp(PS)1/c, USCGR, and written statements were made by J.M. Britton, Erling Strand, Chief Mate, George T. Museth, 2nd Mate and D.A. Lindquist, 3rd Mate. The originals of these statements and samples of gasoline will be retained by this office for use of the U.S. Attorney.

When washing and stripping tanks no. 1 st.b. and port, and tanks no. 2 cross, gasoline was coming out through the stripping lines. The gasoline covered an area of about 10 feet by 40 between the ship and wharf. Upon noticing it the stripping was stepped immediately and a hose was connected to the wharf.

Upon leaving New Orleans the ship had an gas free certificate and the valves checked after leaving Baton Rouge where tanks no 5-6-7-8 and 9 cross was leaded with 100 gasoline.

In my opinion this is nebedy's fault, but we are taking steps to investigate where the gasoline is coming from.

Bort Arthur, Temo COMMANDENS OFFICER U.S. COAST CULAR OFFUR Port Arthur, Texas 28 June, 1945 29 Juse, 1965 On June 28, 1945, at 1500 while making a routine inspection at Magnolia Docks at Beaumont, Texas, I noticed gaseline spreading from the S/T Marne. I immediately shocked with the Chief Mate, Erling Strand, who was absard the vessel, as to the cause of the spill. They were clearing and washing out the tanks. I asked the Chief Mate to step the pumping at once, which he did, and I informed him that the Oil Company had slop lines for the disposal of wash and bilge water. The gasoline had covered and area of about 10 feet by forty feet. I took a sample of the water, and statements from the Chief Mate, 2nd Mate and 3rd Mate.
