GUN CREWS: 8 - Mr Norwegian Army and Navy men in gun crew (regular members of ship's force) 2 certified merchant navy defense officers. REMARKS: 6 - smoke floats: 6 smoke float igniters: 8 steel helmets: 3 civilian gas masks: Cement slabs used around the bridge and radioroom for protection. (Bull degaussed). It is the opinion of this office that the above-mentioned armament is carried for defensive purposes only, provided that this vessel is employed in normal trade.
