Subj: Daytime distress signals on SS WILLIAM GASTON

- 1. The SS WILLIAM GASTON was torpedoed and sunk on 23 July, 1944. During the investigation of the above casualty survivors stressed the effectiveness of the daytime distress signals aboard the SS WILLIAM GASTON in expediting rescue operations.
- 2. Since the SS WILLIAM GASTON was last inspected in your district HQ requests that you procure, as soon as conveniently possible, the name of the manufacturer and the numbers of the lifeboats on the SS WILLIAM GASTON and the name of the manufacturer of the daytime distress signals with which such lifeboats were equipped.
- 3. The SS WILLIAM GASTON was operated by the American West African Line, 17 Battery Place, N.Y.

1. The information requested in HQ letter of 4 January, 1945, is as follows:

Lifeboats Nos. A168, A169, and A170 on the subject vesselwere manufactured by the Neptune Boat and Davit Company, Inc., and lifeboat No. 71 was manufactured by the Imperial Boat and Davit Corporation.

2. To date this office has been unable to obtain any data from the American-West African Line in regard to the manufacture of the daytime distress signals.

WILLIAM GASTON In reply to your letter of January 10, this is to advise that we have purchased for the subject wessel in January, 1943, sixteen (16) daytime smoke signals from William E. Williams, Inc. at New York. These were manufactured by Sam Jackson Company. However, we also purchased for the same vessel in July, 1943, twenty (20) day time smoke signals which according to our records were intended for the rafts. These were purchased from Baker, Carver & Morrell of Philadelphia, Inc. and they are said to be manufactured by the Sculler Safety Corporation. These according to our records are the only smoke signals we have purchased for the vessel. For any further information you may require, kindly address your request to the writer's attention.
